Introduction

Safety & security in children's ministry goes beyond just screening your volunteers. In this workshop we will look at some practical ways of keeping the kids in your ministry safe. This will include radio communications and having a strategic lockdown & evacuation plan.

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
Deadly Force Incidents

Total Deadly Force Incidents - 1,705


Attacks Resulted in Death of Victims - 812

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II. Involving Your Church Security Team

On-site security team or leadership team –make sure to work with them to approve evacuation plans and procedures. Management or designated security individuals come in handy when you need extra resources during an evacuation, especially with children.

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III. Emergency Action Plan (EAP)

A. What is an EAP

A plan that has been developed by your church to define the actions to be taken prior to and immediately following a major disaster.

B. Why have an EAP

The worst time to prepare for an emergency is during one! A disorganized response can result in injury, damage and possible loss of property and life. That is why it's so important to have an Emergency Action Plan (EAP) for staff, volunteers, and leadership.

C. The Purpose of an EAP

The purpose of an EAP is to establish an organizational structure and procedures for response to major emergencies. It defines the roles and responsibilities assigned to individuals responsible for acting on the plan during an emergency.

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IV. Emergency Procedures

An emergency can include either natural disasters such as a fire, flood, earthquake, blizzard or manmade disasters such as arson, an onsite active shooter, bomb threats, etc. Whichever category your emergency falls under, a plan is needed, especially if you have children in your care.

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V. Evacuation Plan

A. Evacuations

What situation would determine if an evacuation is necessary in the children's area?

1. Training

a) Ensure all staff members are aware of their role and understand how to proceed - Knowing your roles saves lives.

2. Locations

a) *Primary Location*

(1) *Unscheduled Evacuations*

(a) *Security Team occupies area 1st*

b) *Secondary Location*

Jonesborough, Arkansas - March 24, 1998

Mitchell Johnson, 13 and Andrew Golden, 11 shoot their classmates and teachers in Jonesboro, Arkansas. Golden, the younger of the two boys, asked to be excused from his class, pulled a fire alarm and then ran to join Johnson in a wooded area 100 yards away from the school's gym. As the students streamed out of the building, Johnson and Golden opened fire and killed four students and a teacher. Ten other children were wounded.

The two boys were caught soon afterward. In their possession were thirteen fully loaded firearms, including three semi-automatic rifles, and 200 rounds of ammunition. Their stolen van had a stockpile of supplies as well as a crossbow and several hunting knives. All of the weapons were taken from the Golden family's personal arsenal. Both of the boys had been raised around guns. They belonged to gun clubs and even participated in practical shooting competitions, which involve firing at simulated moving human targets. Golden reportedly shot several dogs in preparation for the actual shooting.

3. Children with Disabilities

Prepare for children with disabilities – know exactly what is required to get them out safely.

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4. Attendee Roster

a) Physical Copy

b) Digital Copy (Real Time)

Check-In/Out with a real-time attendee roster – For the children's area make sure you have a digital live roster with you during an evacuation. Once you arrive at the designated area outside the building, take a head count to confirm you have everyone. As parents begin to arrive to pick up their children, now you can complete check-out and update your data all at the same time. Attendance records are an important item when evacuating. Electronic children's check-in systems can help here.
